

#### NCCDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE REFLECTION by ALEXIS HILL

2024 Graduate Student Scholarship Recipient

Attending this year's NCCDA conference was a great experience. The theme of Unlocking Career Potential was portrayed throughout the conference breakout sessions. With many interesting topics, there were two sessions I thoroughly enjoyed. The first was "What's Your Why?: Having Powerful Conversations With Students Considering Graduate School" given by Amanda Brumfield, and the second was "Constructing Career Futures: Facilitating Students Building Career Self-Efficacy Through Life Design" by Yolanda Jarrett.

The breakout session led by Amanda Brumfield was exciting because of the work I do with students as a graduate assistant in the Career Development Center at NC State. I often encounter students who have either decided that they want to go to graduate school, or are toying with the idea of going to graduate school. This breakout session explored multiple approaches to ensuring that students considering graduate school are asked essential questions that help the student explore their reasoning behind the idea of attending graduate school including looking at timelines, cost of attendance, and also research that plays a big part in looking into the many options or alternatives that are out there. There are also resources shared that I look forward to sharing with the students I work with should they find themselves thinking about graduate school.

The second breakout session that I attended led by Yolanda Jarrett explored life design career counseling. Though this breakout session was targeted to those who work with youth of school age, I found that the information and strategies shared could also be used with students in a college setting, especially those students who may be exploring majors or careers. Guiding students through self-efficacy in a career setting can look like exploring and capitalizing on the student's interests and guiding them through unlocking their potential as the theme of the conference mentions. This breakout session reassured me that the approach utilized with students should be tailored to meet them where they are in their journey. I thoroughly enjoyed my time at this year's NCCDA conference and hope that this was the first experience of many.

The 2024 NCCDA Conference was definitely one for the books! From insightful discussions on strategies for having meaningful conversations with students considering graduate school, to discussions on career pathways for undocumented K-12 and higher education students, and many other topics, I left the conference feeling inspired, energized, and excited. I particularly found Dr. Doug Mayes's closing keynote, "Unwritten Rules: What Social Science Can Teach Us about Hiring," to be very impactful.

Dr. Mayes's address delved into human capital theory, signaling theory, and the overall inequalities in the job search process. His words resonated with me as a first-generation college student. As a first-generation college student, I knew that there were a lot of 'unspoken rules' in higher education that impacted how I navigated my undergraduate institution. However, it was when I was in the job search process that I realized 'unspoken rules' would continue impacting me beyond my educational journey — they would also impact my career journey.

Later that day, I started to think about conversations I have had with the students and recent college graduates I worked with, and how excited and grateful I am to be part of their education and career journey. The 'unspoken rules' and inequities will continue to be part of our society, but career development professionals actively help students learn how to navigate the job search process through workshops, services, advising appointments, etc., so that students feel confident and prepared as they start or continue their career journey. I want to help students achieve their educational and career goals and thrive in the spaces they enter by assisting them in learning to navigate the job search process and workspace.

Dr. Mayes's keynote underscored the importance of being aware of the inequalities that impact students' career journeys. It also underscored, to me, the need to actively work towards creating a more inclusive and equitable environment for all students to thrive.

Thank you, Dr. Mayes, NCCDA, and all the presenters and guests for fueling my passion for career development. I am grateful for the opportunity to have attended the conference and for being a recipient of the Graduate Student Scholarship.
